

Through the nonfiction exemplar text, THE SODA BOTTLE SCHOOL, children will learn about students in Guatemala who built a school out of old soda bottles and other plastic trash. Then they will write their own narratives to explain the school construction and share ideas for making new creations out of trash.


1. Building a Soda Bottle School

a. After reading The Soda Bottle School, write an informative/explanatory piece to explain how the Soda Bottle School was built, including materials and order of construction on Story Sheet (p. 8.)



- b. Construct paper soda bottle school with:
 - Project Pages (p. 5-7)
 - 8" x 12" construction paper
 - glue
 - crayons or colored markers
- i. Cut out 4 soda bottle walls and roof. (optional: color roof)
- ii. Glue floors of 4 walls together as shown



- iii. Fold 4 walls up and attach to each other using glue on side tabs.
- iv. Fold and glue roof to top tabs.
- v. Glue soda bottle school and story on construction paper.

Write a narrative describing your own idea for a useful creation you could make out of trash. Draw a picture of your trash recycling idea.


